REGISTRATION PROCEDURE & ADMISSIONS PROCEDURE

Thank you for your interest in enrolling or re-enrolling your child at St. Maria Goretti School. Please review our [Registration Procedure](#), [Admissions Procedure](#), and [Application for Enrollment](#). We appreciate your attention to all deadlines.

Registration Procedure

All kindergarten applicants must meet the definition of an “Active Parish Family” when applying for admission for Kindergarten at St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish School for the:

- A. Fall of 2010 (age 5 by September 1, 2010),
- B. Fall of 2011 (age 4 by September 1, 2010), and,
- C. Fall of 2012 (age 3 by September 1, 2010).

Application for Enrollment forms are available on all school days during the month of February in the school office and on-line at www.stmariagoretti.org. Please note that we have separate *Applications for Enrollment* for:

1. K-8 children registering for the 2010-2011 school year (yellow forms);
2. 4-year-old children registering for Kindergarten for the Fall of 2011 (pink forms);
3. 3-year-old children registering for Kindergarten for the Fall of 2012 (green forms);
4. 3- or 4-year-old children registering for Preschool for the 2010-2011 school year (blue forms).

These forms must be completed and returned to the school office with a \$50.00 per-child non-refundable registration fee attached, **on or before Thursday, February 25, 2010 @ 3:00 p.m.** Please note that completing an *Application for Enrollment* does not guarantee your child’s admission to St. Maria Goretti School and Preschool.

Only fully completed registrations will be reviewed by an Admissions Committee appointed by the Pastor of St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish and considered under our **Admissions Policy**. Applicants will be notified by Friday, March 26, 2010, as to their admission status for the next school year.

Families of 3- and 4-year-olds (birth date by Sept. 1, 2010) registering for Kindergarten in Fall of 2011 or Fall of 2012 will be informed of their child’s enrollment or Wait List status by Friday, March 26, 2010.

In order for a child’s registration file to be complete, we must receive the following items by the end of the registration period. If any item is excluded, your child’s registration is considered incomplete. She/he may then be placed on a Waiting List (see Admissions Policy)

- Application for Enrollment – signed and dated by parent(s).
- Please note that we have separate *Applications for Enrollment* for:

1. K-8 children registering for the 2010-2011 school year (yellow forms);
 2. 3- or 4-year-old children registering for Kindergarten for the Fall of 2011 (pink forms) or the Fall of 2012 (green forms); and,
 3. 3- or 4-year-old children registering for Preschool for the 2010-2011 school year (blue forms).
- Non-refundable \$50.00 per-child registration fee (this amount is deducted from tuition, upon a child's admission); this applies to those students who will be/remain on a Waiting List (see Admissions Policy). This non-refundable \$50.00 per-child registration fee for 3- and 4-year-olds (birth date by Sept. 1, 2010) for Fall of 2011 or Fall of 2012 is a one-time registration fee for Kindergarten.
 - Birth Certificate verified by *school personnel*.
 - Baptismal Certificate copy on file *at school office*.
 - Previous school records, if applicable (must include records for academics, attendance, and conduct).
 - Professional evaluations: academic, behavioral or medical conditions/concerns that could affect learning.
 - Medicine disclosures.
 - Custody agreement disclosures.
 - ***Information as to your families status as an "Active Parish Family" as defined in the SMG School Admissions Policy. ("Active Parish Family" status will be considered when confirming enrollment for all current and future students.)***

Admission Procedure

- We will initially place approximately 45 students in Kindergarten so that we may accommodate any extenuating circumstances.
- The remaining positions will be filled within three weeks of the end of the registration period.
- A letter informing you of your status will be sent at that time.

ADMISSIONS POLICY

The following criteria have been set for the consideration of admission of students to St. Maria Goretti School.

- ✚ Children are considered for admission without regard to race, gender, national or ethnic origin.
- ✚ A child must be age five (5) by September 1 to enter Kindergarten and age six (6) by September 1 to enter First Grade.
- ✚ The following are the priorities for admission of registered students to SMG:
 1. K-8 Students enrolled at St. Maria Goretti School at the conclusion of the previous academic year whose families are **Active Parish Families**.
 2. Siblings of K-8 students currently enrolled at SMG or whose siblings are graduated alumni and whose families are **Active Parish Families**.
 3. Children of parish and diocesan employees who are employed by the parish or the diocese for at least one calendar year and whose family is an **Active Parish Family**.
 4. Siblings of previous K-8 students at SMG whose families are **Active Parish Families**.
 5. Children of parent(s) who have attended St. Maria Goretti School who are **Active Parish Families**.
 6. Children of families who are **Active Parish Families**.
 7. Position on a **Waiting List**.
 8. Children of families who are active parish families in a Catholic Parish that does not have a Catholic school.
 9. Consideration is given to all other applicants.
- ✚ Commitment to the principles of St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish & School, as expressed in the Parish and School Mission Statements.
- ✚ Previous school records, including references to academic performance, school attendance and conduct.
- ✚ Openings in a particular class.

An **Active Parish Family** is defined as registered members of St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish. To be a registered parish member, at least one parent/guardian must be a practicing Catholic. An Active Parish Family participates in the worship opportunities of the parish (e.g. Sunday liturgy, liturgical seasons, prayer services, Lenten Mission, etc.), provides financial support and volunteers their time on behalf of St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish and School. A vital part of being an Active Parish Family includes the completion of the “Time and Talent” survey, which indicates where an individual may be best-suited to serve the St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish community. Volunteer activities which indicate a desire to serve the parish community shall include (but not be limited to): serving on committees and councils, liturgical ministry, lector, choir, ushering, teaching religious education, parish festival, seasonal clean-up of the parish facilities, field trip chaperones, room parent(s), sports coach, assisting with pageants and skits, and classroom activities.

A ***Waiting List*** is maintained for all grade levels as required and will be used for placement of students from the time of the lists annual review until the following January 15th. No applicant shall be placed on the waiting list until they meet the definition as an “***Active Parish Family***”. Qualified applicants will be placed on a Waiting List after the registration process is complete. The Waiting List will be reviewed and regenerated annually, after the registration process is complete based on the validation of **Active Parish Family Status**. Priority placement on the Waiting List is determined in accordance with the priorities for admission of registered students, with special circumstances to be reviewed by the SMG Admissions Committee. Applications received after the completion of the registration process will be placed at the end of the Waiting List. Parents and Guardians of children on the Waiting List shall be responsible for maintaining accurate records of current address, phone numbers, and other identifying information. If a family is offered enrollment, and declines the opportunity, that child shall be removed from the Waiting List.

- ✚ Non-parishioners shall pay 100% of all educational costs.
- ✚ The number of K-8 students in each section per grade level is usually limited to 25 students. The number of preschool students in each section is usually limited to 15 students. St. Maria Goretti School is not always able to meet the exceptional education needs of all students.
- ✚ Up-to-date immunization records for all students must be completed and returned to the school office within the first 30 days of attendance.
- ✚ No child shall be denied admission to St. Maria Goretti School for financial reasons alone. *Application for Financial Aid* forms are available in the school office. Please contact the SMG principal for more information. *[All information pertaining to financial assistance will be sent from and turned in to the Parish Business Manager to maintain confidentiality.]*

When making decisions on student admissions, the SMG Admissions Board will consider all aforementioned procedures and policies, in addition to information and/or input from a student-applicant’s family, SMG faculty, SMG administration and/or St. Maria Goretti administration.



SCHOOL FEES – 2010-2011 SCHOOL YEAR

TUITION- PRE-SCHOOL

2 day program - **\$175** per month

3 day program - **\$240** per month

The tuition is due by the 10th day of the month; September through May.

TUITION-K through 8th GRADE

One child - **\$2,425**

Two children - **\$4,850**

Three or more children - **\$7,032**

Non-parishioners tuition - \$3,767

Options for paying tuition for the 2010-2011 school year are as follows:

1. Paid in full by **September 15, 2010**.
2. First semester tuition (½ of the total) is due by **September 15, 2010**
3. Second semester tuition (½ of the total) is due by **January 14, 2011**.
4. Monthly payments for tuition only are due by the **15th of each month (September-May)** as follows:

One child:	8 payments of \$275; 1 payment of \$225
Two children:	8 payments of \$550; 1 payment of \$450
Three or more children:	8 payments of \$800; 1 payment of \$632

BOOK AND MATERIALS FEE

\$375.00 per student - **due within two weeks following admission to the 2010/2011 school year, unless other payment arrangements have been approved, via letter, through the Parish Business Office.**

FUND-RAISER FEE

\$230.00 per family - This fee can be paid in full by **September 15, 2010**; or can be paid in two payments, due by **September 15, 2010** and **January 14, 2011**.

Please be aware that all school records will be held in the school office and final report cards will not be distributed until all financial obligations have been met.

Financial aid is available to qualifying parish families. Applications for financial aid must be received by September 15th (for the first semester or for both semesters), and by January 15th (for the second semester only). Families, who qualify, will be awarded aid by October 1st and February 1st, based on the family's need and the availability of funds.

V. SCHOOL PROCEDURES AND POLICIES

TRANSFER STUDENTS

All students transferring into St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish School are admitted on a probationary status. Probationary status recognizes that the adjustment to a new situation can be difficult, and that special effort may be necessary to succeed. The student will be evaluated on an ongoing basis for a semester for academic and behavioral progress.

ARRIVAL/DISMISSAL

It is necessary that students be regular and punctual in attendance. A child is considered tardy if he/she arrives after 7:50 a.m. There will be no supervision prior to 7:25 a.m. or after 2:10 p.m. on Monday or after 2:40 p.m. Tuesday-Friday. For this reason children are not to come to school early and are to leave at dismissal. No child will be permitted to leave the grounds with another child or adult without written permission from his/her parents.

To provide for the safety of our children, please adhere to the following guidelines when picking up children at the end of the day:

- There is no parking along curb outside the school office
- All parents should Enter & Exit through the correct driveways
- All children should remain by the front doors until they see their parents
- Parents are responsible for the after-school supervision of their children
- Drivers should keep the traffic moving whenever possible
- Only Handicapped individuals may park in the Handicapped lanes
- At no time should pets be brought for pick up or drop off

We request all K-8 parents who choose to pick up their child to wait outside the school entrance. Preschool parents may enter the building. Homeroom teachers will escort their children to exit the school building.

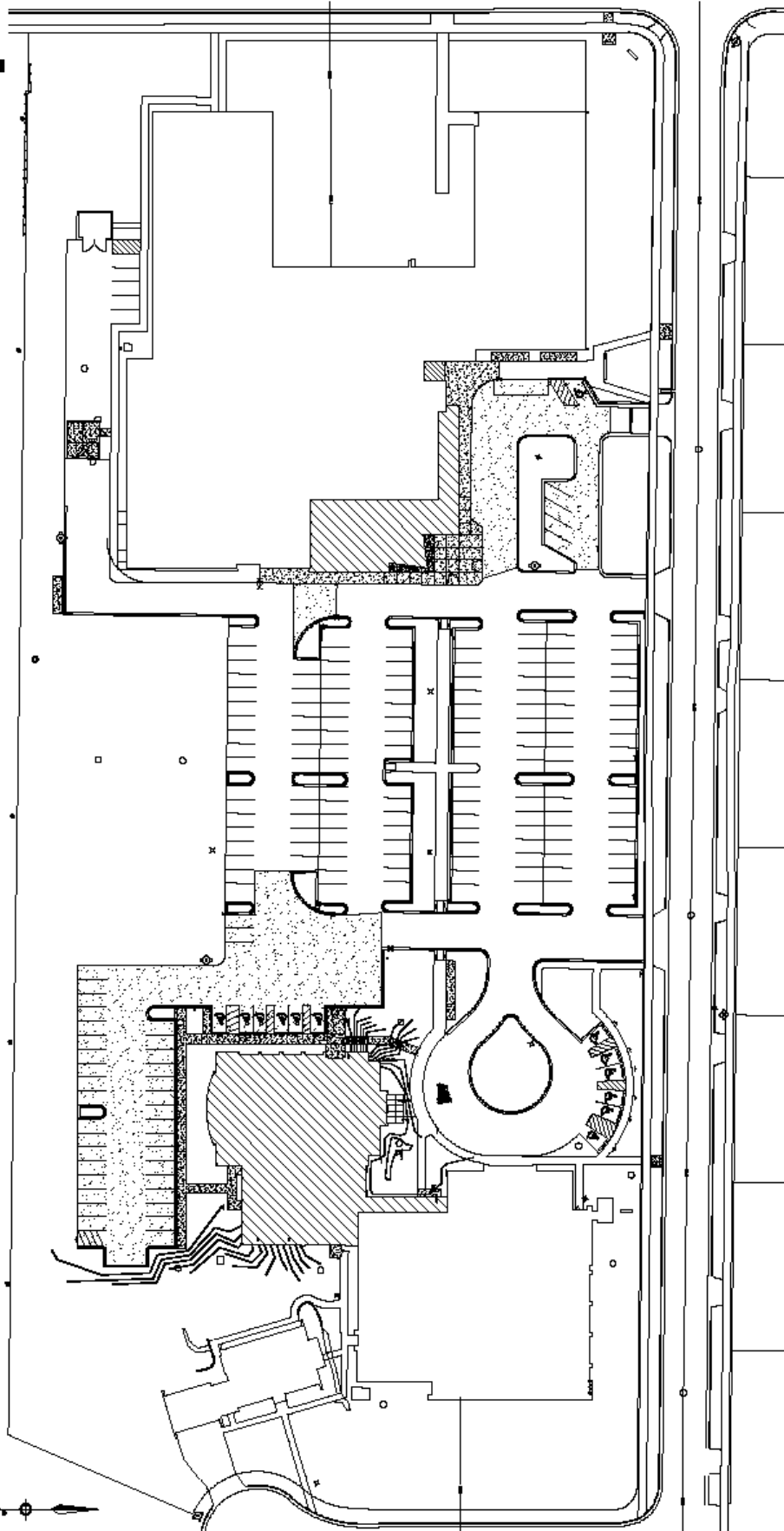
After five times of late pick-up, a reminder letter will be sent home, along with follow up from the principal.

STUDENT BEHAVIOR & DISCIPLINE

“God looked at what He had created, and all of it was very good!”Genesis 1:31

In the same spirit of this Scriptural understanding of the goodness of all of God’s creation, we expect all members of the SMG community to reflect a respect for this goodness. These expectations for student behavior have been developed with this foundation of our Catholic faith in mind.

Code of Conduct:

In a spirit of cooperation, we encourage and expect all students of St. Maria Goretti Catholic School to follow this Code of Conduct:

With Jesus as my model,
I will respect others and myself.
I will respect personal property and that of the school & parish.
I will be responsible for my learning and my actions.
I will challenge myself to strive for excellence.
In all aspects of my life I will live the Gospel.

General Expectations Following the example of Jesus, SMG students will:

- Show respect for all members of the school community – self, teachers, principal, staff, volunteers, parents and other students;
- Respect the property of others;
- Use appropriate language;
- Follow uniform policy;
- Complete homework assignments;
- Follow playground guidelines;
- Respect the school attendance laws of the State of Wisconsin;
- Show care for all school materials such as textbooks, library books, lockers, desks;
- Take pride in our school building by taking care of our school facilities and grounds - classrooms, locker rooms, bathrooms, playground, etc.;
- Respect life by not endangering oneself or others by fighting, nor having or using tobacco, other drugs, or weapons of any kind;
- Act in a manner that is appropriate for a Catholic school;
- During the school day, there are no electronic devices allowed (i.e.-cell phones, i-pods, games etc.)
- Students will not be allowed in any unsupervised area of the school.

PLEASE NOTE: Our school is drug-free, weapon-free and harassment-free.

Harassment includes any type of bullying. Bullying is any abuse of power by an individual or group who deliberately targets others for repeated physical, psychological or emotional abuse. Examples of bullying behaviors include, but are not limited to: a pattern of intimidation, threats, menacing taunts, teasing, spreading rumors, and/or picking-on/isolating others by gender, and/or other psychological abuse. Bullying can also include physical contact aimed at provoking a defensive or aggressive response, or, in the extreme, causing injury or a pattern of deliberate exclusion of another with the intent to be hurtful. St. Maria Goretti Catholic School does not condone, accept or tolerate such behaviors.

The Diocese of Madison's Board of Education has developed a policy that we implement here at St. Maria Goretti Catholic School regarding sexual harassment [DBA 4200]: "All persons involved in educational programs are entitled to a working and learning environment free from all forms of discrimination including sexual harassment or intimidation. No educational employee, volunteer, or student shall be subjected to unwelcome sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other sexual conduct, either verbal, visual, or physical."

BEHAVIOR CONSEQUENCES

When students do not meet their obligations for acceptable behavior, appropriate actions and consequences will be taken and implemented to insure that the learning environment remains a safe, positive one for all. Parents will receive notification from school personnel when their child behaves poorly. The cooperation of parents and teachers is essential. If misunderstandings arise, parents are asked to see the child's teachers. If satisfaction is not reached, then parents are to see the principal who will help work out an acceptable solution. We may also require a behavioral contract in cases when a student has had repeated instances of making poor conduct choices. Parents and the student will be apprised of the details of the behavioral contract in a conference with the principal.

Consequences for poor behavioral choices may vary according to age and development. Most consequences are intended to be open and flexible – allowing for teacher discretion to determine what intervention should follow a sequence of steps, or, if the teacher deems it necessary, to skip steps (e.g. endangerment of a person's health and/or safety). The school principal will also exercise her/his discretion regarding following or skipping a sequence of steps for consequences.

These consequences include, but are not limited to the following: detention, conferences with parents/principal, individual contract to improve behavior, suspension, expulsion (the suspension/expulsion policy follows).

Although the school is not responsible for off campus behavior at non-school sponsored activities, if the results of that behavior affect the workings of the school day, the administration may determine that consequences would be justified.

We reserve the right to deem certain behavior inappropriate and impose appropriate consequences for such behavior.

Student behavior which can lead to consequences would include, but is not limited to:

- Lying, **cheating and forgery;
- Disrespectful behavior towards faculty, students or property;
- Physical or emotional abuse of others;
- Deliberate actions to disrupt classes;
- Leaving school premises without permission and/or supervision;
- Repeated violations of school rules, with no regard to prior warnings or consequences.
- Any acts of retaliation.

** Cheating will result in a detention and notice sent home. Cheating will also usually result in receiving a zero for that particular offense.

SEARCH AND SEIZURE

The school retains the right to search a student's locker or have a student empty her purse, book bag, or pockets when reasonable cause exists. Any searches will be conducted by an administrator in the presence of another adult. Parents may be notified if a search has been conducted.

MIDDLE SCHOOL CONSEQUENCE STRUCTURE

MOST circumstances requiring behavioral consequences for middle school students (grades 6, 7, and 8) may include, but are not limited to the following sequence:

1. A verbal warning is issued to the student from the SMG staff.
2. If verbal warning is not heeded, an after school detention from 2:40-3:10 pm will be issued. Parents are notified in writing.

3. If a student fails to return the written notification signed by the parent, a phone call will ensue. Further actions will be determined.
4. At any time the principal will determine an additional appropriate consequence, in accordance with this Family Handbook.

ST. MARIA GORETTI SCHOOL SUSPENSION & EXPULSION POLICY

All parties (parents, students and school personnel) acknowledge that, consistent with Christ's teaching, it is not acceptable at SMG for students, parents or school personnel to seek retaliation in instances where one has been harmed. Examples: if a dispute arises between two students on the playground, and one child hits another, it is not acceptable at SMG for the other child to strike back.

In determining inappropriate behavior all parties (parents, students, school personnel) acknowledge that school personnel make this determination.

Suspension/Expulsion –The suspension/expulsion policy has been established by the St. Maria Goretti Catholic School Education Commission, per Diocese of Madison Board of Education policy # DBS 5120, "Each Parish Education Commission shall establish a policy on suspension and expulsion standards and procedures for their respective school." This suspension/expulsion policy has been developed utilizing Diocese of Madison Board of Education Policy #DBS 5120 relating to the suspension and expulsion as a minimum standard and a guideline.

Suspension is for a serious offense against the good conduct policies of the school community. An in-house suspension may be served by students.

Actions resulting in suspension include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Any form of Harassment
Gross defiance of persons and/or rules;
- Disrespect toward staff, students, volunteers, property;
- Preventing a teacher from teaching;.
- Continuous upsetting of order in the classroom, or the school in general.
Any action that could result in expulsion as identified below

Expulsion is an extreme measure and will be used only on very rare occasions. A student may be expelled for repeatedly refusing or neglecting to obey school rules. A

student may be expelled from school by engaging in conduct that endangers the health, safety, or property of others. The school, working with the parents, should make serious efforts to correct the negative behavior before expulsion is considered.

Actions resulting in expulsion include, but are not limited to, the following:

- Any form of Harassment
- Striking or assaulting any school employee;
- Unprovoked battery and/or attack resulting in injury of another person;
- Exhibiting, using or threatening to use any dangerous weapons on or near the school premises;
- Use or possession of any controlled substances.

GRIEVANCES

Consistent with dispute resolution guidelines of the Diocese of Madison, parties in dispute with any SMG Family Handbook policies or this Student Behavior & Discipline Policy shall proceed as follows:

The dispute must first be discussed and a solution sought at the immediate level of dispute – involving interaction with and between the parties in conflict (e.g. student to student, teacher to student, parent to teacher, etc.)

If further recourse is needed, the disputing party shall be referred to the principal.

If the principal's recommendation is not acceptable, the disputing party shall be referred to the Pastor and/or his designee (which may or may not include the Parish School Subcommittee of the Christian Education and Formation Commission of the Pastoral Council).

Student Behavior & Discipline Policies Review:

The Student Behavior and Discipline policies outlined in this Family Handbook have been reviewed and approved by the St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish Christian Formation/Education Commission, the St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish Pastoral Council and the St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish Pastor.

UNIFORM POLICY

Specific uniform clothing options are available on the website.

VISIBLE CLOTHING MUST BE UNIFORM CLOTHING, OR THE CHILD WILL BE ASKED TO CHANGE. (ie.-CAMISOLES OR T-SHIRTS UNDER TOPS MUST NOT BE SEEN).

SHOES: If students choose to wear flip-flops, they must stay off the wood chips for safety purposes.

The three options that you you can purchase the uniforms and they are Land's End, JcPenny and SMG Gorettiwear.

Land's Ends website is www.landsend.com. Please refer to our school identification number when making purchases. That ID# is: 9001-0852-3.

JcPenny's website is www.jcp.com.

*We encourage families to plan ahead and use SCRIP to purchase uniforms. This helps in two ways: the school will receive a percentage of each purchase (17% - Lands End: 5%-JC Penney) and each family can receive a tuition credit based on the amount of SCRIP that is purchased.

*If you have questions or if purchasing uniforms will be cost prohibitive for your family, please feel free to contact the school office. (271-7551)

Uniform Non-Compliance

First Offense: Written Notice sent home.

Second Offense: Phone call to parent-change of clothes.

Third Offense: Your child will be issued clothes from the used uniform sale to change into.

OTHER:

Physical Education clothes are limited to P.E.(No shoes that leave black marks on the gym floor will be allowed).

Grades K-4 do not change clothes for P.E.

Grades 5-8 change into appropriate shorts and t-shirts

Pre-School basically follows regular school policies – but has a different expectation for footwear.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

For your child's protection, please call the school office 271-7551 (by 8:30AM) if your child will not be in school that day. **A dated, written excuse must accompany your child upon returning to school.**

Excessive absence (40) days or the equivalent of 40 days including tardies, can be cause for a student to be retained in the current grade for another year.

Please avoid scheduling dental or doctor appointments during the school day. However, should such an appointment be necessary, your child will only be permitted to leave the grounds by presenting a written note from you. Students who are away from school for an appointment for 3 ½ hours or more, will be counted as absent for ½ day. Your child **MUST** be signed in and/or out of the building by the parent/guardian. Sign in/out sheets are in the school office.

In cases when students are absent and/or tardy more than 4 times per academic quarter, the student's parent(s)/guardian(s) may receive a letter and/or call from the SMG principal as a reminder to assist with tending to attendance issues.

SOCIAL NETWORKING

Cell phones, music/game devices are not to be used at SMG. Any electronic equipment used during the school day will be confiscated. Parents/guardians may pick them up in the office. They will not be returned directly to the student.

Teachers are not allowed to be involved in social networking such as Facebook and MySpace.

RED ALERT-EMERGENCY CLOSING

When morning weather conditions are such that the school might be closed, you will receive a phone call or email from our Red Alert system. If the Madison Public Schools

are closed, St. Maria Goretti Catholic School will also be closed. However, St. Maria Goretti does reserve the right to make its own decision about closing. If severe weather conditions develop during the day, listen to the radio and television for announcements. Parents may pick up their children early after contacting the school office. Children will not be released early from school without parental consent.

SCHOOL SECURITY

**New this year-security cameras have been installed inside and outside of the building. This is to help us maintain a safe environment.

A Safety Manual with specific procedures is located in the school office. A review of all procedures is conducted annually. The following security measures are currently in place at St. Maria Goretti Catholic School:

- Established drop off and dismissal traffic patterns are in effect.
- Front doors will remain locked until 7:30 a.m. when appropriate supervision is in the building - all doors are locked 24 hours a day except the front door.
- A FIRE EVACUATION PLAN specific to each classroom location is posted by the exit.
- We have tornado, fire drill, bomb threat and other types of building evacuation procedures in place with specific codes. A mutual agreement exists between Orchard Ridge School and St. Maria Goretti Catholic School to share each other's facilities in the event of an emergency.
- Procedures are in place in the event of a playground emergency.
- Four adults supervise the noon recess .
- Our students use the Buddy system whenever outside the school.
- Protective Behaviors are taught within the first two weeks of each school year and are reviewed periodically throughout the year.
- Teachers and staff are instructed on implementation of safety procedures.
- Students are always supervised.
- We always have more than the legal requirements for field trip chaperones.
- We have established a visitor sign-in and sign-out in the office.

CUSTODY ISSUES

In the event of a divorce or separation it is assumed by the school that each parent has been awarded equal rights in regard to access to their children. If there are special circumstances such as sole custody, limited access or restraining orders, copies of these court documents must be on file in the school office.

LUNCH PROGRAM

An in-house hot lunch program is available for students in grades K-8 everyday. Menus are provided on our website. You may also pick up a copy in the office. Meal selection includes a choice of 2 entrees and salad bar. A tally will be taken each morning to determine the number of meals that need to be prepared that day. Cost for students is \$2.25 per meal. Parents, siblings and others are invited to join us for a fee of \$2.75. Please call the school office in the morning and have your name added to the tally. Extra servings are available for a fee of \$1.00. A lunch “bank account” is kept with monthly statements generated to keep you up to date of your available funds. Money is paid in advance for meals, and you may not carry an outstanding balance for more than one month. You may see your lunch account balance on Teacherease.

All parents are expected to volunteer in the cafeteria/kitchen, five times a year. You have the option of paying a \$100.00 fee in lieu of volunteering your time. “No show” volunteers will be charged \$30.00, and these funds will be paid to the parent who replaces you. You may try to find your own replacement if you need to change your duty day, or have unforeseen circumstances that prevent your helping on that day. We need to have 4 volunteers per day to make the program function well. Milk is included in the cost of a hot lunch meal, but must be paid separately if your child/ren takes cold lunch. This cost is \$.30.

There is a milk program for the pre-school program only, and is offered 5 days a week. Orders are placed in advance, and, payment must be made by the semester. An informational letter is sent home at the beginning of each semester.

LUNCHTIME PLAYGROUND – RECESS

We have paid regular paid supervisors on our playground during the lunchtime recess. Each family will be asked to pay \$65.00 to help defray the cost of the supervisors. It is important to have consistent supervision for the safety of the children. Each supervisor will have Virtus training and a thorough Background Check.

While we realize that there are certain times when the weather is too inclement for anyone to be outside (in which case indoor lunch and recess periods are scheduled for all) please bear the following in mind when preparing the children for school:

Please prepare your child for cold weather. Areas of the body vulnerable to exposure to the cold should be covered (i.e. head, neck, hands, feet, etc.). In order to play on the snow at morning drop-off and/or recess, children in grades K-5 must have snow pants

and boots. Middle School students must have boots. Without this clothing, children must stay in dry areas.

When is it TOO COLD for children to be outside? Plan to send your children outside each day. Prepare them for cold weather each and everyday. We will make the decision for outside recess each day depending on the weather.

PLAYGROUND RULES

- Students may not congregate on the bike racks, the island, or go behind the buildings. They are not allowed to throw bark chips or gravel which are in some of these same areas.
- Children should stay clear of parking lot entrances.
- No throwing of woodchips.
- If there is water underneath the slides or the swings, then these pieces of equipment cannot be used. Slides and swings can only be used if the ground around them is dry.
- No walking up the slide.
- One person at a time on the slide or on a swing.
- No tackling.
- Snow or ice may not be handled or kicked. Students can build forts and snowmen but snowballs or ice in their hands with the possibility of having it thrown or kicked will not be tolerated.
- Space Web: No standing on top ropes
No sitting or standing on red support bars
- X-Wave- (K-5) Maximum 12 kids seated
(6-8) Maximum 6 kids total
- Students must receive the supervisor's permission to enter the school building.

- Students must get the permission of the playground supervisor to use the bathroom and let supervisor know when they return.
- The students will be advised in school when they should remain on the paved areas due to muddy conditions.
- All children should stop playing when the bell rings and line up in the proper place.

Students who show disrespect for the supervisor or who refuse to comply with the rules will lose playground privileges. Disagreements among students, which cannot be mediated on the playground, should also be brought to the attention of their teachers.

We would also encourage parents to review basic safety precautions with their children. All students should remain in sight, not behind the building, etc. Remember to caution the children that our play area is accessible to the street, so the boundaries are necessary for their protection from speeding cars and undesirable strangers.

HEALTH

A student needs to be symptom free for 24 hours before they can return to school. (I.E. Fevers, vomiting, diarrhea). Also, if a student is put on an anti-biotic, they must be on the medicine for 24 hours before returning to school.

No student is allowed to leave the school building because of illness without first reporting to the school office.

The following are the minimum required immunizations for each grade level. Even though your child meets these minimum requirements, he or she may be in need of booster doses.

Please note:

- Student immunization record forms must be turned into the school office by the first day of school
- MMR vaccines must have been received on or after the first birthday
- If your child received the third dose of DTP/DT/Td and polio after the fourth birthday, further doses of these vaccines may be recommended, but are not required
- 2 doses of varicella (chickenpox) vaccine for students entering Kindergarten, And 6th grade.
- 1 dose of Tdap (tetanus, diphtheria and acellular pertussis vaccine) for students In 6th grade.

VAR means Varicella (chickenpox) vaccine. Chickenpox disease history is also acceptable.

MEDICATION POLICY

No prescription or non-prescription medications (including cough drops) shall be administered by school personnel or their agents to a student until a Medication Consent Form has been completed by the student's parent or guardian and returned to the school office. (Sample Form enclosed)

VI. CURRICULUM

CURRICULUM DEVELOPMENT

At St. Maria Goretti Catholic School, we provide an educational experience that is both comprehensive in meeting the standards and expectations of a high-quality curriculum, and allows for the uniqueness of each student's learning ability. Our school is fully accredited by the WRISA, which requires our ongoing review and updating of curriculum consistent with standards set by the association.

Curriculums are reviewed on a rotating basis. The following are years the curriculums are scheduled for review:

We are a Catholic school community. Throughout our curriculum, we incorporate the values, beliefs and tenets of our Catholic faith. Pope John Paul II notes:

“Catholic schools transmit knowledge and promote the human development of their students... The mission of the Catholic school is the integral formation of students, so that they may be true to their condition as Christ’s disciples and, as such, work effectively for the evangelization of culture and for the common good of society... In the Catholic school, there is no separation between time for learning and time for formation...” (1998)

On a daily basis, our qualified staff delivers learning experiences that are shaped by the nuances of particular students’ learning as well as the demands of a contemporary, and reasonably flexible curriculum. This approach reflects the “hands-on” research of our school’s educational leaders, with special attention given to the Catholic Diocese of Madison Religious Education Standards and the State of Wisconsin Model Academic Standards.

MASS ATTENDANCE AND FAITH DEVELOPMENT

The students of St. Maria Goretti Catholic Parish School (Grades 1-8) shall have the opportunity to participate in the Eucharistic celebration by attending Mass twice weekly. Grades 1-8 attend on Friday, grades 1-4 attend on Tuesday, and grades 5-8 attend on Thursday. Class attendance may change periodically. We encourage you to join with us in fostering devotion in our children from their earliest years. Kindergarten students will attend mass and/or prayer services each semester.

As a Catholic school family we value and promote our opportunities to develop a personal and communal prayer life through prayer and scripture in the classroom. During all-school gatherings we celebrate the seasons of Advent, Lent and Easter, as well as Church calendar feast days. With this gift of religious freedom we are better able to foster a deeper personal relationship with Christ.

SPECIAL NEEDS

The following procedures are used for academic intervention by the faculty of St. Maria Goretti Catholic School to support students with special learning needs:

- The classroom teacher identifies the need and makes adjustments in teaching techniques in the academic classroom.
 - The following interventions and supportive planning are discussed with parents to assist a student's learning:
 - *Parental assistance in studying and/or organizational skills
 - *In school or after school tutoring
 - *Summer tutoring
 - *Evaluation by Madison School District or a private provider may be requested. Once an evaluation is completed, the parents and teacher/s will review the findings of the evaluation and its recommendation and make a plan for the student that will be in his/her best interest.
- Note: St. Maria Goretti School does not have licensed, certified Programs for students with identified Exceptional Education Needs (EEN) as defined by PL 94-142 and Wisconsin Chapter 115.

PRIVATE TUTORING

- Scheduling of private tutoring is done through the classroom teacher and the tutor(s).
- All requests for tutoring shall be submitted in writing to the school principal for approval.
- Students are referred by the classroom teacher.
- Specific lessons can be requested by the classroom teacher, parent, or guardian.
- Students who attend St. Maria Goretti School may be released from class for in-house tutoring sessions.

GRADING

Students in grades 1-8 receive a report card at the end of each academic quarter. Grading scales are provided by individual teachers.

Students in kindergarten receive semester report cards (January and June). Report cards are issued quarterly at the end of nine-week cycles for first through eighth grade students.

CONFERENCES

First semester conferences with all parents and teachers are scheduled after the first quarter. Second semester conferences may occur in the spring this year. More information will be forthcoming. Contacts with the home, if needed, are made through notes, phone calls or e-mails. A requested conference may be scheduled at any time throughout the school year.

When an individual concern arises regarding curriculum, the first step for the parent is to see the teacher or person most immediately involved. Usually the problem can be solved. If satisfaction is not reached, then parents are to see the principal who will help work out an acceptable solution.

HOMEWORK

Homework is assigned as a means to help students review, understand and enrich subject matter taught during class. Homework is not a substitute for work that belongs in the classroom. Only minimum homework assignments are expected for youngsters in the first and second grade. About one hour of homework per school day may be expected of students in grades three through five and about one and one half hours of homework may be expected of students in grades six, seven and eight. Homework is an expectation for all grades K-8. Time will vary with age of student.

Students are to come to class prepared. Teachers and parents need to communicate if a student is having difficulty with homework.

Parents should check with their child's teacher if he/she will be absent due to vacation.

Parents who wish to get daily homework for an absent student should notify the school office by 9:00 AM. Assignments can be picked up at the school office at the time of dismissal. If called in late in day, homework will not be guaranteed to be ready.

Teachers are not required to give homework in the anticipation for a vacation. Arrangements are to be made to make up work upon your child's return.

BAND

The St Maria Goretti Band program is provided through Overture Band (882-5581). Students in Grade 4 – 8 will have the opportunity to participate. Introductory information will be sent home with all students in grade 4 and new students to our school in early September. Returning band students will have been sent sign-up materials during the summer. Please call Overture directly with questions pertaining to this program.

BIRTHDAY TREATS

All students are invited to share a birthday treat with their classmates and teachers on their special day. Please bring something easy to distribute. Arrangements should be made for a parent to cut and serve the treat when necessary.

We strongly encourage you to provide a healthy snack for birthday treats, instead of a sweet, sugary treat. Please contact the homeroom teacher for a list of what is acceptable in their room.

Remember—We are a peanut and nut free environment****

Invitations for home parties must be mailed out, not distributed in school.

VACATIONS

We encourage families to plan vacations at times that coincide with the school vacation schedule. Please inform the principal of circumstances necessitating a vacation during school days. Also, parents are to inform the principal if they will be out-of-town and their child remains in the care of another adult. Please leave names, addresses and phone numbers of the adults responsible for the care of your child. We also request emergency contact information.

SCHOOL VISITS

Visits to the school or classroom are welcome. Make arrangements one day in advance so that schedules can be checked. ALL parents and visitors must report to the office and sign-in before going to the classroom or any other part of the school building. We appreciate our visitors respect for classrooms in session or daily prayer over our public address system. Please stop and join in our prayer if you are in the building at these times.

Please remember that all pets are to stay off school grounds.

PETS

Please note that pets are not to be brought to school for any purpose. Not for drop off or pick up, or for show and tell. There are many students who have severe allergies. Also, some people are very uncomfortable around animals.

APPOINTMENTS

The value of conferring with teachers cannot be over-emphasized, but a teacher may not be interrupted during class except in an emergency. If you wish to confer with a teacher or with the principal, please make an appointment by calling the office during the school day and that person will return your call.

FRIDAY FOLDERS

All correspondence from the office and classroom will come home with your child each Friday, via the red Friday Folder. Tuition bills will be emailed to you. Hot lunch balances are available on the Teacherease System. Calendars, menus and other sheets will be available on the school website for you.

You may return any paperwork, or bills through this same folder. All folders will be collected each morning and all necessary paperwork turned into the office. Please join us in making SMG a greener place and save a tree or two! Please note that the Friday Folder is not a forum for invitations and such.

ROOM PARENTS

Each class is assigned two room parents to aid in implementing class, school, or Home & School Association projects. These parents assist at class parties, field trips, emergency phone calling and other activities.

FORGOTTEN ITEMS

All forgotten items must be dropped off at the school office. Student use of the telephone is limited to emergency situations only - no student has permission to call his/her parents for forgotten articles except for lunch. Phone calls are limited to encourage responsibility with students. This includes homework, gym clothes, projects, books, musical instruments, rides home at dismissal time, making plans to visit friends, etc. The phone is not to be used to make playdates after school.

VII ASSOCIATIONS AND VOLUNTEERS

VIRTUS TRAINING

All parents are asked to attend a Virtus Training program. The program is offered through the diocese. You can sign up on-line at www.virtus.org. The password is trust. There are many options for the program. You do not have to attend the program at St. Maria Goretti. Please make sure to register at the meeting. No parent will be allowed to volunteer in the classroom or lunchroom if they have not attended a session.

ATHLETICS

All students in fifth through eighth grade may participate in interscholastic sports as part of the Madison Area Independent Sports League. Regulations for participation in the Sports League are explained in the St. Maria Goretti Athletic Handbook available from the SMG Athletic Association.

The Athletic Board of the Home and School Association provides personnel and equipment required for participation in the Sports League. A nominal per sport participation fee is required.
